Under contract W-14-108-Eng-18 (cost shared between the AEC and African Metals), Le Doux had a sampling representative at the Mallinckrodt Chemical Works in St. Louis, Missouri to weigh and sample radium sludges. Le Doux rotated representatives in from their New York office. The available records refer to assaying operations and do not indicate any radioactive materials going to Le Doux's New York office. Furthermore, any other records found would probably refer to assaying operations and not reveal any new information. No licensing data have been found for LeDoux. We are in receipt of your letter of December 27, 1951, concerning the material which remains in the Q-11 drums after dumping.

This matter has been receiving our attention since Mr. Theys's visit to Middleser on October 15, 1951. We agree that any material left in the drums after dumping should be removed therefrom before disposing of the drums. We believe, however, that the amounts reported in your letter do not represent a normal condition for these drums. The drum used for this sample was picked out of a group of drums as one which had retained the most material after dumping.

Nevertheless, we are planning to install some sort of positive drum cleaner, somewhat similar to your suggested "mechanical rotary brush" idea, as soon as such a device becomes available. In the meantime, additional precautions are being taken at the plant to recover all material which remains in the drum. These precautions consist of a more careful initial beating after dumping and a second beating and inspection of drums before they are removed from the area.

We will be glad to keep you informed as to our progress in this matter.

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To our knowledge no action has yet been taken on our memorandum to you of November 13, 1950 "Services of Ledoux".

There continues to be a dual responsibility regarding the weighing and sampling of K-65 and raffinate date and we are continuing to have to arbitrate various special sampling problems to satisfy both Hallinckrodt and Ledoux. Mallinckrodt is becoming increasingly discontented with having Ledoux here when Article I-B of Contract a eng-8 states that Mallinckrodt is responsible.

Hr. Roboff mentioned to us about a month ago that a cable had just been received from Belgium stating that the Belgians wished to have Ledoux supervise the weighing and sampling of Plant 6 by-products. We have heard nothing more since them. If you wish to comply with the Belgian request and have a Ledoux representative here we strongly recommend that Article I-B be modified appropriately as soon as possible. Please give us your decision soon as Mallinckrodt is pressing us for our position in this matter.

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Attached hereto is a copy of a memorandum from C. L. Harl concerning the possibility of suspending the services of ledoux & Company at Mallinekrodt Chemical Works.

Elimination of the services of Ledoux and Company would result in a monotary savings to both the Commission and African Notals. The cost of the Ledoux contract in 1950 was approximately \$12,500 which, as you know, is borne in equal shares by the two parties. It is estimated that hiring a new man'at MCH to perform the required duties would increase their costs by about \$5,000 per year, including ovorhead and markup. This would indicate savings to African Metals and the Commission in the order of \$6,250 and \$1,250 respective ly.

I believe the above savings could be accomplianed without sacrifice of the desired control. It is appreciated that no action can be taken on without the concurrence of African Metals, I would appreciate, therefore, your advice on how we abould proceed.

> Flease refer to your memorandum of December 6, 1950 on the above subject in which you asked that we submit our recommendations concerning Contract No. W-14-108-eng-18 with Ledoux and Company.

We have discussed with Mallinckrodt the means by which their organization would take over the supervision of weighing and sampling operations now performed by the Ledoux representative. There is an existing employee in the Mallinckrodt laboratory who now supervises all sample preparation and processing who will have time to supervise overall the work now supervised by Ledoux.

Because of the high monetary value of K-65, Mallinckrodt and we both believe that a specially-designated competent employee should be used to perform the actual weighing of K-65 drums. Such an employee can be hired for \$300 per month. This employee would spend about one-fourth of his time on the weighing of K-65 and the other two-thirds of his time on the auditing and spot-checking of various weighing and sampling operations in all of the Mallinckrodt plants in the interest of better SF accountability. It has become apparent recently that it would be highly desirable to provide for these SF auditing procedures in any case.

We believe that the above arrangements will (1) give equal or better measurement of by-products (because divided responsibility will be eliminated), (2) make it possible to comply with the requirements of Article I-B of Amendment No. 45 to our Contract No. W-lh-108-eng-8 with Mallinckrodt, and (3) give a savings of at least \$55000 per year to the Commission even if all of the proposed new \$300 per month employee's time is charged to the work now performed by the Ledoux representative. We accordingly recommend that Contract No. W-lh-108-eng-18 with Ledoux be terminated. Mallinckrodt will be able to take over all of the work now performed by Ledoux within ten days after notice from us to proceed.
